


Immigration and Ethnocultural Dashboard

Purpose of this Document

Immigrants contribute to our economy, not only by filling gaps in our labour force and paying taxes, but also by spending money on goods, housing and transportation. The purpose of this document is to provide an overview of immigration and ethnocultural statistics to help us think about what actions may be needed to make this Municipality a better place to work, settle and belong for newcomers.

Statistics Canada uses many immigration and ethnocultural variables. Information on key standardized variables, including definitions, usage and classifications, can be found at bit.ly/MunDashboard.

Visible Minorities

- 6.5% (800 people) of the Municipality of Kincardine's population reported as being a visible minority in 2021, compared to 34.3% (4,817,360 people) for the province.
- The top visible minority groups reported were South Asian (400) and Filipino, Arab, Chinese and multiple visible minorities all reporting 100 people. It is important to note that while there may be other monitories living in the community the numbers are below the 100 thresholds so it reports as zero.


Do these changes have an impact on programs and services? And what are those impacts?




Profile or Cultural Origin




The majority of residents are of European origins and could include some newcomers/ immigrants and some generational residents. North American origins need to be explored more as it is the second highest segment of the population.

Visible Minorities



As expected, most of the population (11.3K) are not visible minorities. This matches the previous chart based on culture, with the majority being European and North American. South Asian's make up the largest population of visible minorities with 50% share of the visible minority population. This could point to the type of cultural exposure the municipality could engage in to mobilize this group.


Religious Affiliation



Christian and no religion and secular perspectives make up the large majority (94.4%) of the municipality's population. The next largest group is Muslim at 1.5% followed by Hindu at 1.1%. This could point to the types of supports that could be offered in the community to strengthen ties as it relates to religious affiliation.

Immigrant **Statistics**


Place of Birth for Immigrants



Europe represents the largest homeland for immigrants in the municipality at 59.7%. Asia is the second largest trailing at 25.6%.




Immigrant Status



Non-immigrants make up the largest group of the population which correlates with the previous data showing the ethnic culture of the population in the municipality. The overall diversity of the population (10.7%) is guite low compared to Ontario at 30% and Canada at 23% respectively.

Period of Immigration




Immigration by Census period highlights the change in the type of migration that is happening within the municipality. It would be good to understand this change and what could be done to encourage more migration as there is an obvious slow down into the municipality.






Knowledge of Official Languages



92% of this community speaks English only as the region is not in a French designated area this does not pose a problem. However, this could reduce the municipality's ability to engage in Francophone immigration programs and pilots that could be used as a way to grow the population.


First Official Language Spoken

Highest Level of Education by Visible Minority Status



The visible minorities, while not necessarily indicative of the immigrant population, boasts a much higher ratio per capita when compared to the province and the country. The municipality has 61.2% of visible minorities holding bachelor's degree or higher while Ontario is at 39.8% and Canada at 38.4% respectively.


Apprenticeship Certificate by Visible Minority Status



Skilled trades is a significant contributor to the local economy so it is important to engage as many members of the community in skilled trades training to meet the demand of local employers. It is clear that a nonreportable number of visible minorities are engaged and this may be a place for support and training.



Highest Level of Education by **Immigrant** Status



Immigrants in the municipality hold a lower percentage of Bachelor's degree holders at 19.5% compared to 37.3% both provincially and nationally. Postsecondary certificate or diploma below bachelor level was also lower at 19.9% where provincially and nationally they were 24% and 25% respectively. Knowing and understanding these data are important as the municipality looks to match skills to job vacancies to stabilize the local economy.

Apprenticeship Certificate by **Immigrant** Status



Immigrants and non-immigrants have similar levels of apprenticeship certificate holders. Are immigrants given the same recognition of their credentials as nonimmigrants would be important to know for the community.
